End of Year Events & Presentation Day

We are currently finalising our end of year events, ensuring they meet the revised COVID guidelines. The new guidelines allow for parents to be involved only when the physical space allows $4m^2$ per individual. This includes students, staff and visitors. This limits our capacity to have people at different functions. It also means that there are very tight restrictions on the Year 6 Farewell. Parents will not be able to stay or stand around when students are dropped off at the Year 6 Farewell. At this time, parents will be able to accompany their child into the school for a brief time for a photo opportunity under the fig tree.

To be COVID safe and compliant, we need to plan all arrangements on the total number of students and staff likely to attend before we can invite visitors. This requirement means there will be changes to the end of year presentations, so we can have some parental involvement. We will be having 4 different Presentation Day assemblies based on stages to ensure we meet these restrictions. Only students who are receiving awards will be able to attend the assembly in the hall, with each of these students receiving a ticket so that **one parent** can attend. Student cohorts from each stage group will watch online from their classrooms. Siblings at our school, preschoolers and high schoolers will not be able to attend the assembly. We are lucky we have a small Year 6 cohort this year and so **one parent** of each Year 6 student will be able to attend the Stage 3 Assembly. We are currently looking at how we stream these events effectively so that all parents and relatives can view the events effectively.

At this point the timing for the Presentation Day Assemblies will be as follows:

9:45am - 10:30am - Kindergarten

10:40am - 11:30am - Years 1 & 2

12:00pm - 1:00pm - Years 3 & 4

2:00pm - 3:00pm - Years 5 & 6, including Year 6 leaving ceremony

All attendees will need to sign in to be COVID Safe. More details regarding this event will be communicated to families in the coming weeks and parents of students receiving an award will receive a letter soon. Parents who attend an earlier assembly, and do not have a ticket to the next assembly, will not be able to stay onsite even if they are awaiting an assembly scheduled later in the day.

Please be assured that we are following the most current advice and looking for COVID safe ways to celebrate with our students and community. We too are disappointed that some of the fantastic end of year events that staff, students and families look forward to will not be the same this year.

Final Whole School Assemblies for the Year

With the changes in restrictions, we are able to hold whole school assemblies again, however, parents will still not be able to attend. Tomorrow we will have our Leaders' Speech Assembly for 2021. We have an outstanding number of candidates this year, and we look forward to hearing why students should vote for them. There will be no assembly next week due to Stage 3 Camp and the final whole school assembly for the year will be Friday Week 8, 4th December. These assemblies will still be streamed but there will be some minor modifications to meet restrictions. If your child is ready for an award, please ensure the awards are sent to the office <u>before **Tuesday 1**st</u> **December.** Term 4 Citizenship awards will be distributed on Monday 23rd November.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Reports

Our reports will be sent home with students in Week 9. I would like to acknowledge the professionalism of our staff in completing these, which requires a great deal of time and effort. The report describes student achievement in each of the subjects taught in all NSW schools. To prepare the reports, Kindergarten teachers are using a three-point scale to describe the achievement of each student in each subject area over the past two terms. Teachers of students in Years 1-6 will use a combination of an overall mark, using a five-point scale system, and a three-point system to indicate how students have achieved against outcomes and markers taught this semester. The grades are not a pass/fail scale and do not rank your child in their class – there is no predetermined number of students who will achieve any of the achievement levels. It is very important to remember that these grades are only part of the picture of what your child can do. Your child's report will also include information about how hard your child has tried and the teacher's comments about progress in each subject will also add to your understanding. This variety of information will help you discuss with your child and your child's teacher how to provide encouragement and improve progress.

Absences are recorded as of the end of Term 4 Week 7 due to printing deadlines.

Assessment data is collated in an ongoing manner across the Semester.

2020 Review and Future School Plan

In order to improve our practice, we need to continually receive and reflect upon feedback. Over the past few weeks, we have sought feedback on our school vision and future learning model with parents, students and staff. Many valuable insights have been gained on where we are doing well and where we can improve. I really appreciate the effort of parents who made themselves available for the P&C meeting and to those who gave us your feedback by completing the survey. I look forward to outlining our plan early next year.

NAPLAN Readiness Test

With the scheduled transition to NAPLAN online in 2021, next week we will be trialling the school's computer system and Wi-Fi for the NAPLAN Assessment. Students in Year 2 and some classes in Stage 2 will participate in a school readiness test. There is no identifiable information as first names are only used, and neither the school nor parents receive results. The only purpose of this readiness test is to identify any issues with the school system. Next year, Years 3 & 5 students will have the opportunity to complete a practice.

NAIDOC Week 2020

Last week we celebrated NAIDOC Week. The theme this year is Always Was, Always Will Be. NAIDOC Week 2020 acknowledges and celebrates that the first footprints on this continent were those belonging to First Nation Peoples and they occupied and cared for this continent for over 65,000 years. NAIDOC Week is a time to reflect and to celebrate the rich histories, cultures and achievements of Australia's First Nation Peoples – recognising Aboriginal and Torres Straits Islander peoples as the Traditional Custodians of the lands and waters and celebrating their ongoing contribution to our country and society.

All classes participated in these celebrations by decorating the administration building with Indigenous artwork and engaging in lessons focused on exploring Indigenous culture. Thanks to Mrs Farrell and Mrs Ezzy for all their hard work organising these activities.

VIOLENCE AND GRAPHIC CONTENT

Call of Duty has been given an 18+ rating due to "violence against vulnerable and defenceless characters, motiveless killing of innocent characters, graphic violence and use of strong language." Despite the rating, the game is still extremely popular amongst under 18's who could be exposed to violent themes or foul language that parents and carers may not deem suitable or age appropriate for their children.

CHATTING TO STRANGERS

By far the biggest pull for players to Call of Duty is the expansive multiplayer. As well as offering up a wide variety of competitive game modes, Modern Warfare also includes some co-op gameplay modes. Ideally, this means players and children can join a group with their friends and play together online. However, players can play against or with anyone in the world and, with no filter, the language used may often be inappropriate for young children. Due to the competitive nature of gaming and the fact conversations are not moderated, your child could also be at risk of cyberbullying.

LOOT BOXES SWAPPED FOR BATTLE PASSES

is versions of Call of Duty have included 'loot boxes', which have been widely discussed in the news and are considered by critics to essentially promote a form gaml could unlock items as they progress but wouldn't know what they were purchasing beforehand. Modern Warfare however has swapped loot boxes for 'battle passe cans a greater level of transparency as players know exactly what they are buying, how they will be unlocked and when they will receive them in the game.

STICK TO THE PEGI RATING

It really can't be stressed enough how much this game is not for younger children. While you could argue that most of the horrific scenes are in the single player campaign, and you can just play multiplayer and co-op to avoid them, those modes are not without their shortcomings. For example, one of the killstreaks you can attain in multiplayer is white phosphorus - a chemical weapon that can do indescribable things to the human body. This really comes down to the personal judgement of the adult, and the emotional maturity of the child, but if there's still any doubt, stick to the PEGI rating - it's there for a reason.

STAY SAFE DURING IN-GAME CHAT

y default, Modern Warfare allows multiplayer in-game lobbies to have an open hat feature. This basically means that anybody in the lobby with a mic can hop ind say whatever they like. Naturally, this could lead to some profane language desirable viewpoints being expressed. Turning this off is as simple as going to e game options, clicking the audio tab, then setting voice chat to off. Be aware at this also disables the mic on your end too, so the safest and best option is ways to make sure children are in a party with their friends before they start th ame, then they can still chat to each other without outside interruption.



BE WARY OF GORE AND VIOLENCE

There's no getting around the fact that this is an incredibly realistic game, from the themes down to the gameplay, and that includes the amount of gore in the game. While there is an option to disable dismemberment of bodies in the game (options > general > dismemberment of violence that is prevalent throughout.

INCREDIBLY RAW CAMPAIGN

ADDICTIVE NATURE

Call of Duty: Modern Warfare has promised to be the best yet. The game features a number of new game modes and now includes crossplay for the first time, whereby players can now play each other across any device (i.e. Xbox, Playstation or PC). As always tends to be the case when a new game is released, players spend large amounts of time getting to grips with the new features and th repetitive nature of COD means children can find difficult to stop playing and realise their limits.

The single player campaign in Call of Duty: Modern Warfare foct around a war in the fictitious Middle Eastern country of Urziksta features special forces operations, large open battles, chemical weapons and torture. Infinity Ward (who developed the game) I gone on record saying this is the most realistic and grounded ga they've ever made, so it stands to reason that the campaign has generated a huge amount of controversy, especially in today's heated political climate. While younger players might not fully grasp what's going on on screen, it's bound to raise some uncomfortable questions if they're left to play it unsupervised.

TALK TO YOUR CHILDREN ABOUT THE THEMES

odern Warfare at its heart, is a game about good vs bad and the grey areas in tween. Morally complex characters and situations are more prevalent in today's odern age than they've ever been before, and it does carry some important political d social commentary. If you're okay letting children play the game, it's definitely orth sitting down with them to discuss the themes and why it's important to approach en critically. For example, Captain Price is clearly a good character, but he does actionable things in order to achieve his goals. Does this make him a bad character?
